We believe health is a human right, but across the United States, that is not the reality.


America spends \$3.8 trillion on health care annually.

But people of color and the poor are systematically excluded from those resources.

In many parts of the country, there exists a 20-year gap in life expectancy between low-income communities of color and their wealthy white counterparts.

We accompany public health departments to expand and strengthen services around community needs and build resilient capacity



BUILD POWER AND CAPACITY WITH COMMUNITIES:

We accompany communitybased organizations to build power and capacity to improve health in their communities



Moving at the speed of trust, we work with partners to deliver support to migrant farmworkers and strengthen the community health ecosystem

- Partnered with Immokalee's Federally-Qualified Health Center to recruit, train, and mentor 31 *Promotoras.*
- Reached more than **6,800 migrant farmworkers** with COVID-19 and vaccine education, healthcare referrals, and linkages to community resources.
- Launched a social support fund that distributed \$850,000 to 800+ COVID-19 positive residents. 99.3% reported the funds enabled them to stay home and isolate.
